Alison McKay, DVM, Joins Emergency Medicine Team

Alison McKay, DVM, joined the VCA Salem team in mid-September. She hit the ground running the moment she worked her first overnight Emergency shift.

McKay grew up in Roseburg, "raising show rabbits which is probably what first got me interested in animal care and veterinary medicine." However, when she graduated high school her ambition was to be a high school science teacher. She attended Eastern Oregon University and graduated with a degree in Bio-

chemistry in 2007. After earning her bachelor's degree McKay moved to San Antonio, Texas to pursue a graduate degree in chemistry. Shortly after starting graduate school, "it became apparent that life in the laboratory was not for me." So she got a job as a kennel assistant and later as an assistant at San Antonio's only holistic/acupuncture veterinary clinic.

In 2013 McKay got her DVM from Oregon State University School of Veterinary Medicine. Since then McKay has pursued a variety of surgical




things she misses about Oklahoma, "Our pastures are all filled with cattle in Oklahoma. Here you have grass crops and vineyards, which are beautiful, but I miss endless pastures filled with cattle."

Dr. Schofield loves emergency medicine because it is challenging in a very specific way, "the pace is thrilling and the medicine can be difficult. Absolutely nothing feels better than getting through a busy night or a stressful emergency surgery...or both! But mostly I think I have a special ability to be there for a family at a very stressful time. No one plans for an emergency to happen. Emergencies happen at inconvenient times when you have not financially planned for them. Finding a treatment plan that fits both the patient's needs and family's budget can be challenging. Lastly, people, myself included, are not always at our best during stressful situations. I really work to help people get through the stressful situation. It feels so great when a client comes in stressed and upset and by the end of my short time with them I have eased their worries and earned their trust."

After interviewing with several clinics before deciding on VCA Salem, Schofield notes "Quite honestly I chose VCA Salem because of Dr. Thomas and Erin. I believe in them and their vision for VCA Salem's urgent care services. I interviewed in fancier clinics with nicer facilities and brilliant specialists, but there was just something about Dr. Thomas that I instinctively trusted. I think it is rare to have a boss that you feel genuinely cares about you. In Dr. Thomas and Erin I see a team who cares and listens to their employees whether it is another doctor or the receptionist. Liking your bosses is rare and invaluable."

Heartworm Uptick

The Companion Animal Parasite Council developed a "Top 10 Cities" list which highlights those cities experiencing an increase in the occurrence of heartworm (HW) disease. Salem, Oregon is in the TOP 10. Multiple factors play a role in the increased occurrence: warmer days and nights (HDU*; calculated from weather with a 57°F threshold), movement of animals in HW-positive states, presence of vectors, and coyote populations.

DURING THE MONTH OF AUGUST 2018, TEN CITIES HAD THE HIGHEST PERCENTAGE OF POSITIVE HEART-WORM TESTS:
